DOMESTIC TB APPROPRIATIONS UPDATE

The Senate Appropriations Committee has reported out the FY10 Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services (HHS) and Education and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill. The Committee's recommended funding level for CDC TB activities is the same as the President's request and the same level as in the appropriations bill already passed by the House of Representatives: \$144,268,000 for FY10 CDC TB activities, a \$398,000 increase over FY 09.

This appropriations bill reported out by the Senate Appropriations Committee still has to be voted on by the full Senate. There was no special TB-related language in the Senate Committee report related to CDC funding but the report did say: "*Drug-resistant Tuberculosis [TB]*- The Committee urges the NIAID (The National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases) to expand and intensify research into developing new diagnostics, drugs, and vaccines to halt the spread of drug-resistant TB."

The House of Representatives FY10 report language stated: "The CDC Tuberculosis (TB) program provides grants to States and localities for a broad range of tuberculosis control activities. In addition, the CDC supports State and local laboratories and conducts research, epidemiological investigations, and education and training seminars.... *TB Administrative Grant Costs*.--The Committee is pleased that CDC is working with States, territories, and localities to ensure equitable TB funding to all jurisdictions through the distribution formula. The Committee encourages grantees to keep administrative costs at or below ten percent to ensure adequate funds to all jurisdictions in proportion to the number and complexity of TB cases..... *County Departments of Public Health*.--The Committee lauds CDC's efforts to improve and update the funding formula for TB treatment and education, but recognizes that county departments of public health should be included in stakeholder meetings on changes to the funding formula. The Committee directs CDC to reach out to and include stakeholders from county departments of public health suffering from a disproportionate number of TB cases to participate in and contribute to discussion groups involved in the creation of new administrative funding formulas."

TB Intensive; Nov 10-12, 2009; Houston, Texas. This course is designed to enhance the expertise of providers who are actively engaged in the management of patients with, or at risk of, tuberculosis. It strives to improve the skills of physicians and nurse experts who work treating and managing TB patients and contacts. Through interactive lectures and case studies, participants will be able to: describe the current epidemiology of TB in the USA and globally; identify LTBI; demonstrate the immunologic tools for diagnosis of LTBI and their application in the management of TB; implement CDC guidelines for treatment of LTBI; describe current laboratory methods for the detection, identification, genotyping and drug susceptibility testing of M. tuberculosis; discuss the role of the public health lab in the diagnosis and management of TB; identify and implement measures to eliminate transmission of TB in a medical facility; recognize the presentation of TB disease in various clinical settings; discuss antituberculous drugs including common side effects; and implement CDC guidelines for therapy of TB disease. TB Nurse Case Management: San Antonio, Texas; Dec 8-10, 2009. This is an intensive course that provides an in-depth training experience covering knowledge and skills essential for the nurse with primary responsibility for TB case management. It will cover the evaluation, treatment and case management of medically and psychosocially difficult-to-treat patients. The workshop is designed to go beyond the basic TB curriculum and enhance the participant's ability to be accountable for facets of case management by capturing the experience and competencies of expert TB public health nurses now working in field settings throughout the Heartland region. Topics included in the course are: partnering with the community; planning and conducting contact investigations; monitoring responses to treatment; performing toxicity assessments; implementing measures to reduce TB transmission; identifying and managing foreign-born persons at risk for TB; diagnosing and managing pediatric TB and TB in HIV and other high-risk patients; performing case review and quality assurance; balancing responsibilities for public health with the patient's needs and preventing non-compliance through daily observed therapy and enablers; and improving communication and cultural sensitivity skills.
